Learning a language is a lifelong activity. In schools across Colorado, native English speakers are required to take English, math, science, and social studies courses from kindergarten through 12th grade. Yet, the public, and most students, do not accept that learning another language will take just as long.

What should students be able to do at key points in the development of their proficiency in another language? The communication standards from the national standards document and the ACTFL Performance Guidelines for K-12 Learners (American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages [ACTFL], 1999) establish what will be taught and how well students will use their new language. Both documents are equally important because without clear targets for how students should be able to perform in the new language, we either rely on textbooks to set language-learning goals or teach vocabulary and grammar without a conscious focus on the language goals students should be able to demonstrate. Once we establish clear goals for language learning we can actually help students achieve those goals. Teachers can view these documents at the ACTFL website: www.actfl.org

What are realistic expectations for the time it takes to achieve proficiency at the novice, intermediate, and preadvanced levels? The ACTFL Performance Guidelines give realistic expectations and those expectations should guide all instructional decisions. Teachers, parents, and students must base their expectations for successful language learning on the characteristics of real-world communication and accurate descriptions of the stages through which students' progress as they develop increasing proficiency. Imagine knowing exactly where you should be at the end of level 1, level 2, etc! .The 21st century challenge is to create curricula based on how students actually learn languages and how they will use them and adjust our teaching to meet the challenge. Check out the National Standards (the 5 C's) and the Performance Guidelines and see if your teacher expectations are realistic.



WACTFL National Language Teacher of the Year

ACTFL National Language Teacher of the Year Award Process for The Colorado Candidate

So where is our next Foreign Language Teacher of the Year? Is there a colleague in your department who not only is an excellent teacher, but is a leader in the profession, is a strong advocate for world languages, is involved in the school and district in helping advance the concept of language learning for all? Who among you presents and/or shares best practices to other colleagues either through the school or district or at professional meeting such as CCFLT? Who would be an excellent voice for our profession? Honor them and nominate them now. Deadline is Sept. 30, 2009.

Who can nominate? Anyone! District supervisors, department chairs, colleagues, principals, parents, etc, are logical choices, because they are there checking out the pulse of the profession in their own domain. But maybe you want to self-nominate? Absolutely-go for it! The purpose is to give a greater profile to our profession.

PURPOSE OF THE AWARD:

The award for the National Language Teacher of the Year is intended to elevate the status and the public profile of the language profession at the state, regional, and national levels by creating opportunities to recognize accomplished members of our profession. First and foremost, this process is designed to involve all of our state, regional, and national organizations in promoting the language teaching profession. Second, it is intended to create as many media opportunities as possible to increase the visibility and importance of language learning with the media, policymakers, and the general public. The award also recognizes best practices and excellence in the teaching and learning of foreign languages. All regional finalists are featured in the ACTFL Language Teacher Hall of Fame, located on the ACTFL website at www.actfl.org. Key words are excellence in teaching and advocacy.

CRITERIA FOR APPLYING:

Successful candidates must be full-time language educators who spend at least fifty-percent (50%) of their time in direct teaching during the year of application with an expectation of teaching during the next two (2) years.

PROCESS OF APPLICATION:

The National Language Teacher of the Year process begins at the state level with the state language organizations selecting a top candidate each year whose application is then submitted to the regional level. The finalist for each of the five regions then competes at the national level.

PROCEDURE AT THE STATE LEVEL: Deadline: Colorado Deadline: Sept. 30, 2009

The following elements are the criteria for the Colorado Foreign Language Teacher of the Year selection. Please do not staple this portfolio because it will be copied and sent to the evaluation committee. The selection committee is made of foreign language teachers that are members of CCFLT.

The following items must be included in the state candidate's portfolio. Please read very carefully.

- 1. Letter of recommendation from a professional colleague.
- 2. Letter of recommendation from a supervisor.
- 3. Letter of recommendation from a current or former parent or student.
- 4. Curriculum Vitae of no more than five (5) pages.
- 5. Five-hundred-word (500) first-person statement on the value of learning language and culture.
- 6. Provide one example of student work that reflects the goals of the National Standards for Foreign Language Learners. (one page example).
- 7. Provide one page maximum reflection of that piece of student work detailing the theme and/or unit topic, objectives, rationale and outcomes that led to this piece of work that reflects the National Standards. On a separate page include the rubric used to evaluate the work and include a brief one-paragraph explanation.
- 8. Statement of willingness to participate in all required activities associated with the

Award (Form provided by ACTFL: http://www.actfl.org/i4a/pages/index.cfm?pageid=3500 including:

- a. A commitment to attend the respective regional conference for a personal interview (CCFLT provide a stipend to support travel to the regional conference.)
- b. If selected as their regional winner, a commitment to attend the ACTFL Annual Convention (hotel, registration, and transportation are paid by ACTFL); and

GToni Theisen - National Teacher of the Year

From the Magic Kingdom and the wonderment of the land of Mickey Mouse and Donald Duck of the 2008 ACTFL Convention to the halls, hotels and college campuses of our world languages teaching communities, I have had the opportunity of a lifetime to serve as the 2009 American Association on the Teaching of Foreign Language National Foreign Language Teacher of the Year. I am truly honored to have received this award. It was a both challenging and rewarding process to gather evidence from students' work, create a classroom video showing students authentically engaged in learning, respond to a series of important questions relevant to our profession, and participate in an interview process conducted by peers in our field. I especially want to thank all my Colorado Congress of Foreign Language Teachers colleagues for their support and encour-



agement throughout the process and I want to acknowledge the continued support from SWCOLT. Also kudos to ACTFL for their insight and vision in creating an honor like this that gives language teachers a voice among their peers in the education world. Next, I would like to express my sincere appreciation to Holt McDougal in sponsoring this award that supports ACTFL's vision. I

especially want to acknowledge the caring mentorship and encouragement of Lynn Sandstedt, who has guided so many of us here in Colorado. Through the wisdom of Dr. Sandstedt, I have also learned the importance of mentoring our new colleagues. And finally, I would be remiss in not acknowledging my wonderful students throughout all these years.

I have met world languages teachers all over this country. Attending the Southern Conference on Language Teaching in Atlanta, the Central States Conference in Chicago, Southwest Conference on Language Teaching in Oklahoma City and the Northeast Conference in New York, I have had the opportunity to dialog and to collaborative, to teach and to share and to create and to speak. I have learned about unique elementary programs, schools connected with technology, and the differentiated strategies that help students reach their personal goals. I have built wikispaces with groups of teachers, podcasted with kids and created movies with memorable photos.

Understanding that the main focus of this year is continued advocacy for world languages, my message has been twofold. First of all, as just one of the many voices in our World Languages' Community, I constantly advocate for languages to be an integral part of the core curriculum and an essential skill of the 21st century. If our students are going to truly compete with their peers in the world, they must first of all learn to collaborate with them. And where is the best place to start this ball rolling but the world languages classrooms. I wanted to find out what is happening in school districts about this concept and how we can all collaborate to help others outside of our field understand and feel more comfortable in taking action to make this concept come alive. As the Partnership for 21st century skills website (http://www.21stcenturyskills.org) indicates in its seqment about mastery of core subjects and 21st century themes, world languages is listed second in the list of those skills. Meanwhile, Colorado is in the process of updating all thirteen content standards. And yes this time we do not have to beg, plead and constantly lobby to be a part of this action. A task force, supported by CDE, made up of World Languages teachers from around the state is at this very moment creating those new standards our educators will need to guide students to be active participants of a world community. (Just in 6/30/09: CO CDE Postsecondary and workforce readiness skills document released and World Languages appears in this real world state document twice. http://www.cde.state.co.us/communications/newsreleases.html)

My advocacy trails also took me to Washington DC. where I had the opportunity to discuss World Languages issues with Betsy Markey, my 4th Congressional District Representative.

Much to my surprise when I arrived for the annual JNCL meeting, Marty Abbott, Director of Education of ACTFL, informed me of my appointment with none other than the Secretary of Education, Arne Duncan, Albeit, a photo op, Janine Erickson, presi-



dent of ACTFL and I had at least 10 minutes to pitch our ever refined support world languages speech to Mr. Duncan.

He seemed very positive and attentive. I did feel he understands that linguistic and cultural competencies are so needed in this time in the history of our country. But finally, the pièce de resistance of my whole Washington, DC. stay was the opportunity to meet privately with Pierre Vimont, the current Ambassador to the United States from France. As a French teacher, having this opportunity to speak with the Ambassador was beyond anything I could have ever imagined. We had time to chat about the luncheon that the French Embassy will be sponsoring at ACTFL and the current state of affairs of French in the United States. But as we all know it doesn't take long to start talking about students. And my wonderful, creative Loveland High School French IV class decided to take this visit very seriously. They me sent with a "get to know Loveland, Colorado" bag, a baseball cap and all kinds of Valentine's Day goodies from our fair city. But what they did to steal my heart will forever be a lasting memory. They put together (all on their own) a video for Monsieur Vimont, each one preparing a testimonial about why they took French, what they got out of learning French, and what they will do with this knowledge and

ings will follow the end of each Phase of review work.


